



Bull, Barming – New licensee, Daren Hills, now has opening hours 11.30-11.30 and 12-10.30 Sundays. Food is served 12-3, 6-9 Mon-Thu; 12-10 Fri-Sat; 12-6 Sun. On the bar when the branch visited were *Harveys Best, Hook Norton Old Hooky, Ringwood Fortyniner, Robinsons Uncle Sams* and *Sharps Doom Bar* with prices ranging from £3.25 to £3.55. **Redstart, Barming** – This is only a 5 minute walk up North Street from the Tonbridge Road. There is a substantial car park in front and a large garden to the rear with two petanque pistes. When our branch visited here mid-evening they found it to be quite busy with many patrons having already eaten. **King William IV, Benenden** – This was seen to have re-opened in April/ May but no reports have been received as yet from anyone in that area.

**Albion, Boughton Monchelsea** – Now reported as closed.

**Crown, Cranbrook** – Building work seems to have halted here.

**Bell & Jorrocks, Frittenden** – Congratulations to Rosie for completing her 478 mile, MRI Scanner Appeal Bike Ride to Londonderry, for which more than £15,500 has been raised.

**Vine, Goudhurst** – This village centre pub has been bought by Tobyn Excell & Ben Stokes who intend restoring it back into use including serving food and hope to re-open in October.

**Larkfield Priory Hotel, Larkfield –** This has now ceased to sell real ale.

**Wealden Hall, Larkfield** – Now no longer in private ownership, the pub is under the *Greene King* banner and badged as an Old English Inn with. only GK beers available – currently *IPA*, *Abbot* and *Old Speckled Hen*.

Chequers, Loose - New licensee Shaw Cavill took over here on May 1.

Breakfasts are now being served. The *St Austell Tribute* will be replaced by a changing selection of guest ales. The regulars will remain as *Fullers London Pride, Harveys Sussex Best, Shepherd Neame Master Brew* and *Taylor Landlord*. The opening hours have been extended: 12-11 Mon-Thu, 12-11:30 Fri, 9-11:30 Sat, and 12-10:30 Sun. A new website will be available soon.



**Bull, Maidstone** – *Greene King* are yet again causing a stir around the country with their themed eating pubs. Some time ago they removed the sign for the **Bull** on Penenden Heath and left a very plain GK sign. This caused an upset and it was eventually restored. Now the sign again just has the pub name and the theme – the picture being eliminated. Why destroy such well known signs and traditions? If you think this is wrong write to them and complain.

**Fishermans Arms, Maidstone** – Cliff Burke runs this Sheps pub which is far larger than one would expect from the frontage. Though narrow, it has a second room with a dartboard and this leads to a long garden/patio area which soaks up the sun. Cribbage and dominoes are popular. The operating hours are 11-11 (2am Fri/Sat). Sky TV is provided for sports addicts. Free WiFi is present for those that enjoy a drink with their bytes. *Master Brew* and *Canterbury Jack* were available when I called.

Olde Thirsty Pig, Maidstone – Found closed in April, this has been re-possessed by the private owner and having been re-furbished has now reopened. Currently operating from 5pm till 11:30 Mon-Thu, 5pm till 1:30am Fri, 3pm till 2:303am Sat and 3pm till midnight Sun. My bus does not run that late. So it may be suitable for local



insomniacs and late shift workers then. The good news is that the four pumps are being looked after by Alison who used to run the **Black Horse** in Borough Green. The beers stocked will be mostly from Kent microbreweries but *Dark Star Hophead* was on when I visited - a welcome intruder from Sussex.

**R Bar, Maidstone** – Boarded up and For Sale by Auction.

**Rifle Volunteers, Maidstone** – A visit here to cover our Mild in May celebrations also found a polypin of *Goachers India Pearl Ale 5.7%* that had been produced for *Goachers Brewery's* 30<sup>th</sup> birthday and very good it was too. This is one of a few pubs that regularly stock mild ale. *Goachers Real Mild Ale* and *Fine Light* are always on.



**Saxon Chief, Maidstone** – Seemingly allowed to be run down by Enterprise Inns this was closed in March and has now been sold to Chartway Group to be used as offices. Without good tenants and sensible leasing, customers will drift away with yet another loss.

**Wheatsheaf, Maidstone** - Rossa Kenny has introduced a Beer Tasters Card scheme for real ale drinkers. Customers can get a card from the bar which is stamped for purchases of pints of real ale. A free pint is the reward for getting 10 stamps on the card. Several mini beer festivals are held each year. Good quality pints of *Caledonian XPA* and 80/- have been found at the bar recently. *Courage Best* is the regular ale here.

Stile Bridge, Marden – The petanque pistes have now gone and the garden has been paved providing a larger area for customers to enjoy the sun, if we ever get any. We always seem to find something different on the bar here. Sometimes it's a new beer and also new or unfamiliar breweries.



**Unicorn, Marden** – A long overdue branch visit to Marden found us here where Keith had on *Harveys Sussex Best, Shepherd Neame Master Brew* and *Sharps Doom Bar* as a guest. There is now a café in the restaurant area.

**West End Tavern, Marden** – Normally I have no bother with low beams but I was caught out here due to the conjunction of step below and beam above. Still there was no damage to my brain but a loss of some beer from my glass. Here we found it fairly busy with *Adnams Lighthouse* and *Harveys Sussex Best* on the bar. The pub now has new licensees.

Kings Arms, Offham – Alex and Ross held a beer festival from 20-23 June, with 20 beers, mostly from Kent micros. Cool and windy conditions prevailed but I still noted a reasonable attendance by local CAMRA members during the Saturday. The best beers that I found were *Wantsum Black Prince, Tonbridge Alsace Gold, Kent Berry Mild Porter* and *Dark Star Summer Solstice* – no order implied. Three Kent ciders were also available. You do not have to wait for the next beer festival as there is always something new on the bar, just check out the display of pump clips.

**Bull, Sissinghurst**– At this Enterprise Inns pub after a long period of closure and decay, the builders are in, and a banner announces: "The Milk House, Pub. Dining, Rooms".

**Kings Head, Staplehurst**– Licensees, Robbie and Nicola Tallon, have received the Pub of the Year award from Shepherd Neame for greatly increasing the business since taking over five years ago.

Railway Tavern, Staplehurst – Despite the poor light conditions I called in on 29 May as I needed a current photograph for *WhatPub.com*, I was greeted by Ricky Hughes who had taken over on 23 May. Initially putting on whatever beer he had been left, I found *Young's Best Bitter* in good form. Other beers will be featured in due course. The pipes had been given a good clean on take-



over and quality should now be greatly improved with proper standards of cleanliness and maintenance.

**Tickled Trout, West Farleigh** – Licensee Lindsey Taylor has made some changes here. The restaurant has been brightened up with cream rather than the dark red paint. There is now a wheelchair ramp to make the large garden accessible as well as a play area for children. Though mainly a restaurant, there are three regular ales *Fullers London Pride, St Austell Tribute* and *Taylor Landlord*.

**Farm House, West Malling** – Problems with patrons here, concerning noise levels and unruly behaviour, have caused restrictions to be placed on the evening use of the smoking area and a requirement to employ two SIA door supervisors at weekends. Let us hope the trouble makers do not cause problems elsewhere.

The **Old Plantation** in Bearsted: We have had an email from Gill Wedlake telling us that Enterprise Inns have put the **Old Plantation** up for sale. The latest news is that it is being sold as a residential property. We now have a fight on our hands to keep it open as a pub. She says she would be really grateful for any help that local members can give. Following advice from our pubs officer, Gill reports: "The situation at the moment is that we have enough signatures on the Value to the Community form and are still collecting."

Speaking personally, I find it frustrating that it so often seems to be Enterprise involved in these closures. Such pubcos add little value to the supply chain and are usually so enmired in debt that they have to squeeze their tenants into such tight situations that their businesses become unviable. Where's the enterprise in that? I do wish that large pub estates could be made illegal somehow. They are killing our pubs!

Gill now informs us that the pub has been sold to Swift Brothers, who own Swift Roofing among other businesses, and who will surely not want to run it as a pub. Meanwhile the struggle to get Asset of Community Value status continues.

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

The **George & Dragon** in Swanscombe has done it again! Beating competition from worthy Pub of the Year winners from other CAMRA branches in West Kent, the **George & Dragon** has now been voted, by independent CAMRA members from branches in East Kent, the West Kent Pub of the Year for 2013. The presentation will take place at the pub on Wednesday 7th August and all are welcome to attend. This is a significant achievement, and the next stage is the head to head vote against the East Kent Pub of the Year to become the overall CAMRA Kent Pub of the Year.

The East Kent Pub of the Year 2013 is the **Berry** in Walmer, as voted by members, including myself, of West Kent branches. In judging the Pub of the Year, the quality of the real ales, and cider and perry (where available) is of paramount importance but several other factors are taken into account when completing the survey. The initial welcome and quality of service are important and the atmosphere, style and decor of the pub are considered. Overall does the pub offer a focus to the community and offer good value to customers? Both the **Berry** and **George and Dragon** tick all the boxes

The presentation evening in May of the local branch Pub of the Year award to Bob and Bron Veal at the **George & Dragon** was extremely well

we'd attended. and especially like to thank Bron for putting on the food and Nick Byram for showing some of us around the "Cave", the spacious pub cellar where the new Caveman Brewery is located. Three of the "prehistoric" beers were on tap that evening: *Mesolithic* 4.5% ABV, *Prehistoric* Amher 4.5% and

Megalithic 5.9% were enjoyed by all. These and other *Caveman* beers *Palaeolthic* 3.8%, *Neolithic* 4.1% and *Neanderthal* 4.6% have been spotted in several haunts, inevitably at the **Dartford Working Men's Club** (where *Caveman* beers will be available regularly), the **Old Dartfordians Club** in Bexley village and a number of free houses.

Our second well attended presentation evening in May took place at the **Cock** at Luddesdown, the local branch Pub of Year runner-up. The certificate was presented by branch Chairman Bob Belton to licensees Andrew, Denise and Adnam Turner. As mentioned in the previous issue the long serving landlord of this marvellous traditional free house, Andrew Turner is currently suffering poor health (we wish him well) and we are pleased to say that son Adnam is training to run the cellar and the bar so we trust that this wonderful, family-owned pub will continue to prosper and sell traditional *Adnams* real ales, alongside various others for many years to come.

Branch socials have concentrated around rural locations in the spring and summer months and I've started to write these notes on the "longest day", not that you'd credit it in the wind and rain. What happened to summer? Maybe there will be sunshine ahead when you read this? Maybe not? Let's hope the weather stays kind for the increasing number of pub beer festivals around and about. Recent festivals that we are aware of have taken place at the **Rum Puncheon** and **Jolly Drayman**, both Gravesend; the **Rising Sun** at Twitton, the **Queen** in South Darenth, the **Ship** in Southfleet, the **Fox & Hounds** at Romney Street, the **Bull** at Horton Kirby and the **Crown** in Otford. Please let us know about any which have escaped our attention. Four local beer festivals scheduled in August are listed on page 3 of this issue.

As I've been away on holiday I missed most of the above including the **Rising Sun** event in May, where I'm pleased to report that four members from Bexley and Otford met each other there by chance sitting at the same table. I'm planning to visit the **Rising Sun** in August when the real ales and ciders will be complemented by the usual steak night on the Friday, excellent hog roast on Saturday and ploughman's lunch on Sunday. This year the branch will be holding an all day and evening social at the **Wilmington Cricket Club** (see diary page). I'm pleased to report that the **Fox & Hounds** at Romney Street, near Shoreham/ Eynsford has recommenced hosting beer festivals in the garden. We missed the Spring Bank Holiday event but intend to visit the August Bank Holiday beer festival.

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The other beer festival listed in August is a new one at the **Amazon & Tiger** in Harvel on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> August with ten real ales, ciders and live music. This pub is an austere building celebrating its centenary this year and is pleasantly located by the cricket green. We made an unscheduled stop here during our social in June and spoke to licensees Mick & Ange, who are proud to serve an ever changing range of three real ales, with beers from *Kent Brewery* being a favourite. *Lancaster Amber* and *Hogs Back Summer Ale* were sampled that evening.

The scheduled stops on this whistlestop tour were the **Black Horse** at Stansted, selling very good quality *Larkins Traditional* and *Whitstable East India Pale Ale*; the **Green Man** at Hodsoll Street, serving *Dark Star Hophead, Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* and *Sharp's Doom Bar*; and finishing at the **Vigo** in Fairseat. This *LocAle* favourite was offering *Ripple Steam Best Bitter* and *IPA*, which are not quite so local, being from the opposite end of the county. All four of these country pubs were quite busy for a Wednesday evening, which is encouraging, as they all need to be supported regularly by the drinking and eating public.

We have recently visited the remaining two pubs in Southfleet, the **Ship** in Red Street, where we sampled *Wychwood Hobgoblin, Adnams Broadside* and *Wells Bombardier*, and the **Manor Farm Barn** in New Barn Road, offering *Shepherd Neame Master Brew, Spitfire* and *Kent's Best* that evening. Another social took us to the Shorne area where the **Copperfield**, a *Crown Carvery* restaurant pub on the old main Gravesend to Rochester road, had a decent pint of *Sheps Spitfire*. In the two traditional pubs, the **See Ho**, Pear Tree Lane, Shorne Ridgway and the **Rose & Crown** in the village centre, I sampled *Fuller's London Pride* and *Bombardier* respectively. All the beers tasted fine but as CAMRA members, we had hoped to find a more intriguing variety of real ales on offer.

A more interesting range of beers was encountered on trips in the Eynsford, Otford and Kemsing areas. The **Crown** at Otford stocks two house beers from local breweries, *Westerham Otford Crown Bitter* and *Tonbridge Three in a Bed*, alongside cider and rotating guest beers, and always serves excellent home-cooked meals. The **Fox & Hounds** at Romney Street near Shoreham was serving *Goody's Genesis, Cottage Duchess* and *Hepworth Sussex Best Bitter* at the times of visiting, and at the **Rising Sun**, Cotmans Ash Lane near Kemsing, we sampled very refreshing *Hop Back Hop Medley*, *Long Man Sussex Pride* and *Cotleigh Owzatt!* I enjoyed an excellent pint of *Okells Manx Pale Ale* at the **Five** 

**Bells** in Eynsford, which now serves *Long Man Long Blonde* fairly regularly, and we tried *Theakstons Masham Four and Twenty* at the **Malt Shovel**, which has also stocked *Long Man Long Blonde*. On the way back to Dartford we called in at the **Bull** in Horton Kirby which was agreeably busy on a Thursday evening, and the pub is recovering some of its former glory on the real ale front. *Dark Star Hophead* and *American Pale Ale* are fairly regular now; *Skinners Betty Stogs* and *Goddards Fuggle-de-Dum* were guests.

We're always on the lookout for more pub information from the Gravesend and Northfleet areas. Les Broad has visited several pubs in Northfleet, reporting that the **Rose**, Wood Street, near Northfleet station and handy for Ebbsfleet football ground, is a welcoming back street local selling *Millis Kentish Dark*, a very good mild ale, and *Sharps Doom Bar* when he was there. *Millis* beers, often *Gravesend Guzzler* and *Kentish Dark*, are regularly on offer at the **Rose**.

The Coach & Horses, The Hill, Northfleet normally has Banks's Mild and Sharps Doom Bar on offer. This is a cosy pub where good food is available, with steaks at reasonable prices. The Six Bells in Old Perry Street sells Doom Bar and Courage Best and is also noted for its food, with a good value, weekly curry night. The Earl Grey, in Vale Road, a Good Beer Guide regular, is a traditional community local, a welcoming Shepherd Neame tied house serving Master Brew, Kent's Best and seasonal Early Bird in very good condition as usual.

The greatest variety of beer in Northfleet is to be found at the **Campbell Arms** in Campbell Road, another traditional back street community local. Les tried *Oakham Bishops Farewell* and *Lymestone Foundation Stone*, both in good condition, and noted *Weston's Cider* on handpump. Real ales rotate at the **Campbell Arms** and something interesting is usually on offer at the very reasonable price of £2.70 a pint.

Overall the real ale scene in Northfleet has improved recently, especially with real mild often available in two of the pubs. On the down side, two pubs in Northfleet have closed in recent months, the **Prince Albert** in Shepherd Street and the **Rising Sun** in Seymour Road, neither having sold real ale in recent years. We have also been informed that the **Royal Oak**, Stonewood, Bean has closed permanently.

Les has also given me information regarding twelve pubs in Gravesend which, for lack of space now, will be updated for the next issue. One

point worth mentioning briefly is that the **Somerset Arms**, Darnley Road, near Gravesend railway station, is selling selected ales at £2.00 a pint on Tuesdays. The *Kent Brewery Pale*, *Beyond the Pale* and *Hook Norton Old Hooky* were particularly well kept. Also the **Trocadero** in Windmill Street has finally re-opened, selling *Courage Best* and *Wells Bombardier*, initially at £2.10 a pint.

Les also visited the **Black Horse and Hoodens**, Maidstone Road, Borough Green which has new licensees. During his visit the pub was offering *Theakston Double Cross IPA* and *Sharp's Doom Bar*, both served in good condition. Alison, the former landlady, was a real ale enthusiast who gained the pub a place in the *Good Beer Guide*. [*She is now at the Olde Thirsty Pig in Maidstone – Ed.*]. The other pub in the village, the **Henry Simmonds**, opposite Borough Green railway station has three separate rooms, one a large bar with TV screens and pool, a small welcoming centre room and a large quiet room. *Doom Bar* was on offer at £2.90 a pint.

I shall finish this narrative with a few comments from recent visits on my cricketing travels outside the branch area, but not too far away. At the Sussex versus Kent 40 over match at **Horsham Cricket Club** I was encouraged to hear that the beer marquee was selling ten real ales! On inspection I found beers from *Belhaven*, *Hardy & Hansons*, *Morlands* and *Ruddles*....you've guessed it.... all *Greene King* tied beers and at the exorbitant price of £3.80 a pint, pre-poured into a plastic beaker. It seems the *Greene King* have the concession at Horsham Cricket Club as *Abbot*, *IPA and Old Speckled Hen* were available in the cricket club bar, also at £3.80 but served in a proper glass.

The following week I visited the Kent versus Northamptonshire 40 over match at **Tunbridge Wells Cricket Club**. The CAMRA tent was selling all real ales at £3.20 a pint, served in Kent Beer Festival lined glasses, from a large array of breweries, including *Larkins, Tonbridge* and *Westerham* from Kent and *Dark Star, Oakham* and *RCH* from further afield. The pavilion bar was serving *Shepherd Neame Kent's Best Bitter* at £3.00 a pint, but only to members.

We called in at the **Bedford Arms** next to Tunbridge Wells railway station on the way home. This is a *Greene King* house with eight handpumps carrying a minimum of two from the *Greene King* stable and up to six real ales from small breweries. My choices were *Ripple Steam* 

*IPA* and *Franklins Citra*, both very tasty so brownie points for *Greene King* this time. The price bands were a bit steep, starting at good value £3.20 for weaker strength beer, a big hike to mid price £3.60 band for midstrength ales and another steep jump to £4.00 a pint for stronger brews.

Speaking of £4.00 a pint, a friend of mine visited an open air event (non-CAMRA) in the Midlands in June where the participating pubs were selling all real ale at £4.00 a pint (in plastic glasses) with half pints at a ridiculous mark up to £2.50. [4 divided by 2 equals 2 in my maths book: not 2 and a half]. There is a growing trend for pubs to overcharge substantially for half pints, over and above a 5p rounding. As a driver who often drinks halves this is annoying, and overcharging should be highlighted and condemned. Bexley Branch have named and shamed two pubs guilty of this insidious practice and we should all keep vigilant, complain and take action where appropriate.

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

A new venue always brings new problems of logistics; where to put things, will that work or fit in but it all came together - eventually. This year's venue was the **Old Dartfordian's Sports Club** in Bourne Road, Bexley and we would like to thank the club, especially Clive Burke, the Steward, for all their help in enabling this year's event to take place.

Although we had more beer, we also had a record attendance, and unfortunately by 6.15 pm it had all been drunk; our apologies to anyone who turned up and found us dry. You could still have had a drink at the bar of our club of the year. Sorry about the unplanned power cut and indeed the snow on Thursday evening but well done to all the customers for using their mobiles to illuminate the bar!

The Beer of the Festival, as voted for by the customers, was a tie between *Caveman Citra* and *Kent Enigma*. The first cask to run dry was *Pictish Blue Moon* and the most popular cider was *Magic Bus Dreamee Bus* (peach). We would like to thank Jason Batty from the *GBG*-listed **New Cross Turnpike** for arranging the Wetherspoons-sponsored T-shirts, *Westerham Brewery* for sponsoring the glasses, *Magic Bus* for their lovely cider and Flying Firkin for supplying the majority of the beer after our other wholesaler declined to supply our needs. Finally, a massive thank-you to all our CAMRA volunteers (and press-ganged Sandy) and of course our organiser, Alan Boakes, who almost single-handedly delivered another festival.

In pub news, our micropub, The **Door Hinge**, continues to go from strength to strength. Ray informs me that he has already sold over a hundred different beers in the three and a half months that he has been open and has just signed a 12 year lease. The **Royal Standard** in Lion Road, Bexleyheath has a new landlord, one Stuart Anthony who played Simon White in Eastenders, no less. He aims to turn the pub around, although by the sound of it into a nightspot type place. Hopefully, he will try and sell some real ale as well. We will keep a weather eye on the situation. Sad news is that the **Woodman** in Bexleyheath has closed and there is an application for it to be demolished and replaced with flats. An appeal to Bexley Council has been lodged.

As always we have held monthly business meetings, although not in April because it would have fallen on the night preceding our Beer Festival and it was thought that everyone would be too exhausted after a day setting up the festival to really want to attend a meeting (not to mention slightly tipsy after testing the state of the beers and enjoying the hospitality of the club!). In May, we visited the **Robin Hood & Little John** who kindly laid on two milds (May being CAMRA's mild month) where we once again presented them with their Pub of the Year certificate and were duly rewarded with a nice buffet. In June, our business meeting was held at the **White Cross** on North Cray Road. Also in June we held our AGM at the **Crayford Arms** which was well attended and we also had visits from Kae Mendham (Kent RD), Ian Fielder (West Kent AO) and Geoff Strawbridge (London Regional Secretary). The Committee was re-elected and the buffet was consumed along with the recently brewed *Shepherd Neame Mild*.

Our socials this quarter have seen us travel far and wide across the branch boundary and also hold another Saturday social. In April we held our only branch social, starting at the **Royal Oak** in Northumberland Heath. This is a large pub and was part of a pub group which went into receivership late last year but has been bought out by Barter Pubs and is thriving. It offers an over 60's discount on *Courage Best* during the day, Monday to Friday. On our visit, beside the *Courage* there was *Wychwood Hobgoblin*.

After leaving, we walked past the **Duke**, which appeared to be closed, although according to two of our party was open the previous evening. We arrived at the **Brewers Arms** which also had *Courage Best* as well as *Shepherd Neame Spitfire* available. Finally, it was on to the **Duchess of Kent**, which only had *Sharps Doombar* available, and this ran out at 10:30, so some of us decided to return to Bexleyheath and have a final drink in the **Furze Wren** before wending our way home.

In May we crossed the branch boundary into Greenwich where we met up with one member of the local branch. This crawl was on the evening of the slaying of Drummer Rigby at Woolwich, which prevented some members from getting to the event. We met in the **Plume of Feathers**. Here we had a choice of *Fullers London Pride, Harveys Sussex, Sharps Doombar* and *Brockley Pale*. Needless to say, most of us had the *Brockley Pale*. Onwards to the **Cutty Sark** where it was quiz night and quite packed, although we did manage to find seats to consume our choices

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from Youngs Bitter, Special, London Gold and Sambrooks Wandle. Finally, we went to the **Pelton Arms**, which was used as the Nags Head in the programme Rock & Chips (the Only Fools & Horses prequel). A wide variety confronted us here: Greene King IPA, Wells Bombardier, Mordue Workie Ticket, Wadworth 6X, Windsor & Eton Conqueror Black, Black Sheep Bitter, Oakham Bishops Farewell, Titanic Stout plus a cider.

In June we held a Saturday social crossing two branch boundaries. We met at the Jolly Woodman in Beckenham, together with members from Bromley, Croydon & Sutton and even Windsor branches and then began a tram crawl (a couple of buses as well). We called at the Claret (Addiscombe), Cricketers (Shirley) and George, Green Dragon and Bulls Head (Croydon). We were invited by Croydon & Sutton to continue with them onwards as they were surveying other pubs towards Wimbledon for a future crawl of their own and some of our team went with them. Also in June we did a pub crawl of Bromley. We started at the Partridge, a large Fullers pub that had Chiswick, London Pride, Discovery, ESB and Gales HSB available. Across the road to a Wetherspoons pub, the Greyhound, with far too many beers to list here and then ending at the Red Lion, a former Bromley Branch Pub of the Year. Here we found Greene King IPA, Abbot and Bohemian, Harveys Sussex and Woodfordes Nelson's Revenge.

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#### Ripping Yarns – a licensee's story

Following *What a Rip-off!*, the article by MMK Branch Chairman Jeff Tucker in *Draught Copy* issue 171, which queried the pricing strategy of Shepherd Neame in its tenanted houses, a concerned local licensee has contacted the *DC* team to share his thoughts. Here's what he has to say:

"The article in the last issue of Draught Copy echoes a lot of beer drinkers' feelings. As an ex-Shepherd Neame tenant, I do know that their rents can be astronomical. 'Why' is another question, as they charge high prices to their tenants for their own-brewed products," he writes.

Our correspondent, currently a tenant with a major UK pub owning company, says its price list is not too dissimilar from Sheps'. "Spitfire is listed at £112.74, on which I can get a £10.00 discount. However, if I bought direct from Sheps, the price would be £64.49 (9 gals & ex. VAT). This is quite a difference, 67p per pint. So the poor Sheps tenant has a problem. Sheps tenants do not have the option to buy out as they are wholly tied, usually for all beers, wines, spirits and soft drinks. This lack of purchasing power and high rents do mean that some pubs will have to charge more for their beers than, say, a Free House."

"Sheps say that a tenancy is a cheap way into the market, with maintenance and repair down to them. Try getting them to do anything. My old pub had not been painted for 12 years. The agreement said Sheps would complete it every five years, in the end I did it myself, as it was a mess and a bad advertisement. However they held the tenant to his side of the agreement, and insisted the interior was done every three years. A bit one-sided."

"We lost a lot of money running our Sheps pub and although it was not entirely their fault as a new pub/restaurant opened in direct competition to us, they would not reduce our rent to a viable level. However, when a new operator was found the rent was reduced. This is the problem. There are still many people with redundancy/pension/savings who want to run a pub. The brewers do not need to change their rental or sales policies until this pool of prospective operators dries up. Only when this happens will the industry start to return to some degree of sensibility and profitability.", he concludes.

The Musket Brewery team are Mark Stroud, his wife Beccy, together with Tony Williams and his wife, Linda Pizani Williams. All have many friends and contacts throughout the brewing industry and licensed trade. Tony was formerly Managing Director of a local newspaper group, before becoming Head of Media and Marketing for a local council, followed by a similar role in the charity sector. Mark worked in television, before launching his own successful building company.

Mark and Tony sing together in the Holy Cross church choir in Bearsted, near Maidstone and have been firm friends since Tony joined the choir in 1996. Both Mark and Tony are CAMRA members and have been "home brewing" for many years, much to the delight of fellow choristers, who sing the praises of the brewers and eagerly sample the latest brews!

Musket Brewery is a stone's throw from Coxheath, where raw militia and regular troops used to train for what seemed an inevitable invasion from France in the 1700s. The military camp was the scene of several big reviews of troops by visiting dignitaries, including one by King George III and Queen Charlotte in 1778. The brewery is a short distance from Heath Road, with the very straight course of this road being the direct result of work by the military engineers, a fitting environment for the Musket Brewery!

Operating in a bespoke brewery made to their specifications, Mark and Tony will launch the Musket Brewery in October with two craft ales followed by a winter ale, in readiness for the festive season. 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#### **Another Czech Trip**

Prague has a natural attraction for me, as I'm half-Czech, and my father's family all live out there, mainly in Northern Bohemia, close to the German border.

I travelled out on a Sunday morning, which meant an easy trip on the M25 to Heston, where I park the car to avoid paying silly airport parking charges, then catch the 111 bus in. Arriving in Prague, I bought a day ticket for 110 Crowns (or Kc, which are about 29 to the pound). I made my way by bus and metro to my B&B by Kobylisy station. The Pension Lucie proved to be fabulous inside, despite the shopfront-style exterior, with very friendly English-speaking owners and reasonable room rates.

I had done a bit of research before I left, and used the information on *ratebeer.com* to find interesting pubs, small breweries and brewpubs throughout the Czech republic, which proved very useful in most cases.

Having checked in, I set off for my first pub visit, which was a repeat of one I discovered on my last trip. Called **Zly Casy**, it is a few yards north from Namesti Bratri Synku tram stop, served by routes 11 and 18. There are two bars, one in the basement, each serving different beers from all over the country, starting at 35Kc.

I plumped for *Trebonicky Rukodelny Legionar*, a 5.5% beer from Trebonice, costing 45Kc for half a litre (the default quantity in this article). It was an amber colour, with Premiant, Sladek and New Zealand hops, and very nice it was, too.

The upper bar had 12 beers on tap, all from new breweries since my Czech beer guide was published in 2007! My second choice was *Nuselska Bleda Tvar*, a 6.4% dark beer from **Pivovar Dvur Chyne** in Hostivice, 45Kc. This contained Premiant, Cascade and Citra hops, and was billed as an Indian Pale Ale style. It was hoppy and sweet at the same time.

I could have happily stayed there longer, but other pubs beckoned. Crossing the tram tracks and heading uphill brought me to **Pivovar Basta** on Taborska. As it was fairly warm, I sat in the rear garden, where a mynah bird was giving quite a repertoire!

This brewpub offered four draught beers brewed on the premises. I sampled the *Polotmava* (literally 'half-dark') which was very good, and *Svetla Krouzkava*, which was rather interesting and slightly cloudy. Both

The pub also sells bottled beers from the whole world, it seems, including every brewery in the Czech Republic. Most are 35Kc, some 45Kc, but imports can be silly prices, such as *Wells Bombardier* and *Wychwood Hobgoblin* at 125Kc!

Using my 2007 beer guide, I chose *Platan Perla* from *Protivin* at 6%, which was rich and syrupy. *Skalak Svetly Premium* (5.3%) from *Pivovar Rohozec* in Maly Rohozec was pretty good with no gas.

I passed on the Strongbow 'cider' (75Kc), various Belgian beers (155Kc) and Rauchbier from Bamberg in Germany (95Kc) and finished my visit with *Herold Black* from Breznice (5.2%), which was delicious, much like a porter.

On Tuesday, I caught a train northwards alongside the river to Usti nad Labem, which has a brewpub and, would you believe, a pub which is twinned with one in Liverpool! Both are called the White Star. I found the road it was in, but it was long and hilly, so I didn't have time to investigate – one for another trip, I feel.

The brewpub was easier to find, being about 150 yards from the station and 50 yards from the main square. It is called **Na Rychte**, and has a modern courtyard out the back, with a tree growing through the roof, and hops growing up the walls. Mazel Svetly Lezak at 33Kc was slightly cloudy and quite bitter, while I wasn't at all keen on the Vojtech Jantarovy Lezak - luckily I only had 0.3L (23Kc). The Ustecka Rychtarka Psenicne Pivo was the lightest of the three beers, clear and quite tasty. The rest of the day was spent with relatives.

Wednesday involved a train trip out east to Pardubice, home of *Pernstejn* brewery, which is a few yards off the main road from the station to the town centre. There is a brewery tap, where I sampled *Kvasnak* unfiltered at 25Kc. This was cloudy, as expected, and quite tasty.

The *Svetly Lezak* (5.2%) was 15Kc for 0.3L, a cleantasting clear lager. My last drink here was *Pardubicky Porter*, an 8% beer which was sold in 0.2L glasses for 14Kc – wow!



were 34Kc, and *Special* and *Lahvove* were also on sale.

Back to the tram stop and a number 18 to the terminus at Vozovna Pankrac, from where it was a short walk to **U Klokocnika**. This scruffy, smoky pub is a rare outlet for



*Kacov* beers from the town of the same name. *Hubertus Svetle* was a mere 23Kc but was nothing special. It would have been better to get off at the previous stop, Na Veseli.

Monday started with a metro trip to the end of line B at Zlicin, from where a Student Agency coach whisked me to Plzen along the motorway. The train from Prague takes much longer. Throughout the journey, a young lass plied the passengers with free hot drinks.

Plzen has three brewpubs. If I could have worked out where the bus station was on the town map, I would have found the first one sooner, without almost walking past it to get to the town centre!

The **Minipivovar U Sladka** on Podebradova had quite a modern interior and three beers brewed on the premises. The *Polotmavy* at 33Kc was a bit gassy but not bad. The *Special* was not on, so I had a 0.3L of *Svetly* for 21Kc, which didn't have much flavour.

One of the three pubs was somewhere on a long street, so I didn't have the time to try and find it, so my next port of call was the **Pivovar Groll** on Truhlarska, which is a lovely old building opposite a hideous multi-storey car park, north of the town centre. The two beers were *Svetly* and *Polotmavy*, 35Kc, the latter of which was enjoyed at a table in the courtyard.



Back in Prague, I headed for the **Pivovarsky Klub** near Florence metro station, another previously visited pub. This bar stocks six draught beers, of which I had *Opat 14 Polotmavy Special* at 38Kc, a bit gassy but quite pleasant.

Back to Prague, where I caught a 26 tram two stops to Lipanska, followed by an uphill walk to **Kralovstvi** on Kubelicova. This is a *Cerna Hora* tied pub. The *Pater* (32Kc) was clear and tasty, but the pub was a bit dingy.

Another 26 in the opposite direction delivered me to Letenske Namesti, from where it was but a short walk to **Klasterni Pivnice**, which was an old-style pub and thick with smoke, so I didn't bother.

I walked round the corner to look for **Svijansky Rytir** but came across the **Pivni Klub 300** which looked interesting, and may have been the same place renamed. It has four ever-changing beers, and I sampled *Kocour Studentska* at 31Kc from Varnsdorf, where my father used to work in the late 1930s. The beer had a bitter-sweet flavour. House beers seemed to be from *Uneticke Pivovar*.

From there it was two trams to Vodickova where the **Novometsky Pivovar** is right next to the tram stop. There was a queue of people waiting to get in, so I tried the **Branik Pivovar** a few doors along, which had only Inbev beers. The *Staropramen Cerny* (dark) was pretty good, but 48Kc.

Tram no.3 then took me to Bulovka. The **Richter Brewery** pub was not easy to find, but I eventually found it a short walk west of the tram stop. The *Svetly Lezak* (32Kc, 5%) was pretty good, but the pub was quite smoky. The *Tmavy Special* was 6.1% and 23Kc for 0.3L, and had a slight taste of vanilla. Odd. And so to bed......

Thursday dawned, and was to be my last day in the country, catching the last plane of the day home. I caught the 22 tram to Brevnovsky Klaster and found **U Klastera** across the road. This pub has six regular beers and a fortnightly guest, most at 33Kc, and the food is good value, too.

*Cerna Hora Granat*, 4.8%, was almost black and very nice, and *Svijansky Knize* (5.6%) was quite bitter but enjoyable. The pub is very traditional, with dark wood panelling.

My last visit turned out to be the highlight of the trip. The **Pivovar Marina Holesovice** is a huge, brand new pub, brewery and restaurant on the river north of Ortenovo Namesti tram stop. It was hard to find, not being helped by the tramway being closed beyond Holesovice, which meant a longer walk and much asking people for directions.

The brewery equipment is in the centre of the pub for all to see, and they sell six beers brewed on the premises. I only had time to try two – *Tamvy Lezak* (35Kc) was dark and delicious, while the *Indian Pale Ale*, 33Kc for 0.3L, was the best beer of the entire trip. I'll be back!

was always excellent, though, in recent years, multi-nationals have bought up a lot of the bigger breweries. It's good to see that the brewpub concept has hit the country in a big way, not just in the capital.

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
