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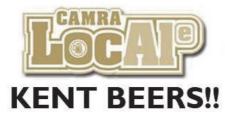

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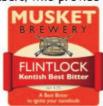

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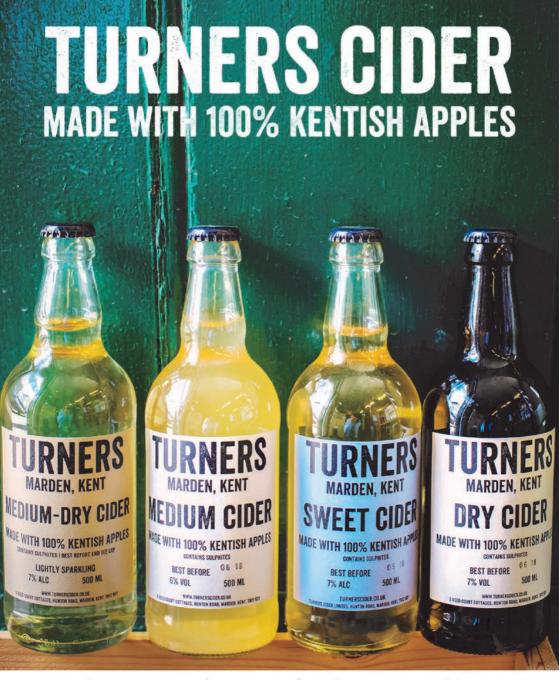

Organisers of CAMRA's East Malling Beer and Cider Festival are making special plans for this year's event on **Saturday August 31**st as it marks the tenth since it returned to the local area, once again to take place in the grounds of NIAB EMR, the world-famous horticultural and agricultural research institute at East Malling.

The one-day event is being organised and staffed by volunteer members of the Maidstone and Mid-Kent Branch of CAMRA and follows in the footsteps of similar events organised by the Branch since the 1970s. The Festival is renowned for showcasing local microbreweries and cider producers, as well as varied brews from around the UK.

Jeff Tucker, organiser of CAMRA's East Malling Beer and Cider Festival, said: "We are planning one or two surprises to mark our tenth Festival at the venue which allows us to put on an event that continues to be an enjoyable experience for all the family. Poppy Fields, Allington – Large family restaurant that now has four reserved places in the car park for charging electric cars. The bar has *Marston's Pedigree, Wychwood Hobgoblin* and two varying beers from the same stable.



Rockin Robin on the Green, Barming – The pub was rockin' when the branch visited in early April with musicians playing. Michelle kindly provided some snacks that proved very popular for which we thank her. On the bar were *Rockin' Robin Reliant, RPA, Blizzard of Oz* and *Reckless*.

Oak on the Green, Bearsted – Always busy here but we found a parking place close to the pub, found a table inside and started on the guest ale *Samuel Adams Blonde Ambition* from Shepherd Neame (4.2%). *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* and *Shepherd Neame Spitfire Gold* also proved to be in good order.

Yeoman, Bearsted – On a visit in mid-March, I found the *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* to be permanent along with one other changing beer that was *Musket Flintlock* and previous had been *Adnams Mosaic*. The revamped pub is strong on food and now has an invitingly light



and airy interior. A special food offer was for two meals for £14. Work on the rear garden was progressing.

King & Queen, East Malling – A change of licensee here with Steve Catchpole taking over. Branch members had a meal here in March and we were happy to find that the same quality of service and good food continues. Beers at that time were *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter, Musket Fife & Drum, Hook Norton Hooky* and *Adnams Lighthouse*.

Knoxbridge, Frittenden – Do you have a classic car or vehicle that you want to show off? The Knoxbridge holds a 'Petrol heads' event once a month, where anyone can bring an interesting vehicle. Dates for the rest of the summer are June 2nd, July 7th, August 4th and September 1st. Go along and see what's turned up in the car park or the back field.

Great House, Gills Green – A visit here found two places in the front car park reserved for electric cars to be recharged. The bar has *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* permanently and accompanied by two others mostly from *Musket* and *Old Dairy* although *Timothy Taylor Boltmaker* was seen alongside *Musket Trigger* on a branch visit.

Woodcock, Iden Green – Re-opened in March, having been closed for over a year. Lindora is the new licensee and the pub is now free of tie. The garden has been tidied up as well as the interior. Food should be available now. The phone number is 01580 240009. *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* is always on and *Rother Valley* provides the house *Woodcock* ales.



Small Holding, Kilndown – Recently celebrated their first year here in which it was voted Kent Restaurant of the Year at the Taste of Kent Awards and Chef Will Devlin won the Kent Chef of the Year at Kent Life's Food & Drink Awards 2018. Brother Matt Devlin looks after the bar where Pig & Porter and Cellar Head beers are among those local products stocked.

Unicorn, Marden - Julia Goodwin has just taken over here as the new licensee so there may be a few changes. Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter and Shepherd Neame Master Brew continue on the bar.



Duke of Wellington, Ryarsh – The annual Beer Festival is scheduled for the first weekend in August. Meanwhile, the regular beer is *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* with St Austell Proper Job, Twickenham Naked Ladies and Kent Pale proving popular guest ales.

Black Horse, Thurnham – A popular venue for weddings, celebrations and conferences now has two charging points for vehicles in the lower car park by the B&B. The house ale is from Canterbury Ales. Sharp's Doom Bar is permanent and there are two guests that, at the time the branch visited, were Old Dairy Spring Top and Whitstable Winkle Picker.

Walnut Tree, Yalding - Rejuvenated by the new business owner who also

has the Chequers in Aylesford. Up to five real ales which are all reduced to £3 on Wednesdays. Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter is permanent and guests ales may come from *Adnams*, *Tonbridge*, *Wantsum* or other local breweries may be found. Noted for good food that is made from fresh local produce wherever possible. There are special offers on pies



on Mondays and fish and chips on Thursdays; a carvery operates on Sundays. At the rear of the car park, is a large enclosed patio with tables and benches



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The Dartford Jug

The branch Pub of the Year for 2019 is the **Old House** at Ightham Common, which also won the title in 2018. For readers who don't know the pub, it's an old-fashioned gem hidden away on the outskirts of Ightham village. By contrast,



the two runners-up are both modern

micropubs, the **Compass Alehouse**, Gravesend and the **Dartford Jug**, Dartford. Certificates will be presented to all three around the time this magazine appears and dates and times can be found in the CAMRA Branch Diaries section.

Two issues ago we reported on the planning application for a

change of use to a micropub in Gravesend High Street, to be known as the **Mole Hole**. The process took a lot longer than would have seemed likely but as these notes were being compiled we heard that approval had finally been granted, a licence had been applied for and work was about to start on the conversion from a tattoo parlour. It is even possible that it might be open by the time you read this. Another application for change of use has been submitted and approved, this time by Sevenoaks Council and more quickly. As a result New Ash Green will be gaining a micropub in a former bank in the village centre.

There have been changes at the **Rose & Crown** in Shorne. Landlord Andrew Doorey reported that *Greene King* beer is no longer sold but there are three alternating guest beers from local breweries, with *Kent Brewery*, *Whitstable* and *Westerham* regularly featured. There was also a mini beer festival with these breweries at Easter.

Laster.


The pub will also be offering CAMRA members a discount of 10% on real ales.

Another pub in the area giving a 10% discount to CAMRA members is the **Ship** at Cobham which on a recent visit had *Old Dairy Red Top* and *Tonbridge Countryman* as well as *Greene King IPA and Abbot*. The **Railway** at Meopham has been closed for a while and some work was underway in April. We understand that this is likely to reopen as a pub.



Another Easter beer festival took place at the **Prince of Orange** in Gravesend. On Good Friday nine beers from Kent breweries were on with another seven plus a craft keg in reserve. Six of the 27 gins available were also made in Kent. Perhaps the highlight was *Kent Brewery Elysium*, 5.9% ABV and unfined, less common for them.

The mention of **TJ's** in Gravesend in the last edition was rather overtaken by events. In addition to the *Greene King IPA* there are currently two rotating *Kent Brewery* beers available. *KGB, Pale* and *Session Pale* have been seen a few times



been redecorated with improved lighting and new signage and it certainly makes a welcoming sight when approaching down the hill from the town centre.

As feared, a planning application has been submitted to build flats on 3 storeys on the site of the **Alma** in Swanscombe which has been closed for some time now. On a happier note the **Rising Sun (Top House)** is 150 years old this summer, though we don't know of any planned celebrations.

A recent branch social took us to the **Railway** at Longfield. There were normally four beers on but one had just run out. The survivors were *Otter Bitter*, *Young's Bitter* and *Titanic Plum Porter* and the last was apparently the closest thing to a regular beer. However as the proof copy of this was being checked, it was reported that the pub was closed and boarded up. We await further

developments. Down the road at the **Rising Sun** at Fawkham the choice was *Courage Best Bitter* and *Directors, Sharp's Doom Bar* and *Fuller's London Pride* and *St Austell Tribute* is often to be found as well. *Directors* is quite rare now though it can also be found at the **Rising Sun** at Swanscombe.

The **Royal Victoria & Bull** in Dartford has, since Christmas, been offering four real ales along with a handpumped *Weston's* cider. Alongside *Sharp's Doom Bar, Dartford Wobbler Guinea Guzzler* and *Penny Red* are pretty regular, and *Hancock's HB* is sometimes available. Sue, the manageress, wants to keep *Dartford Wobbler* beers but this depends on continuing demand.

The **Woodman** on East Hill now keeps very irregular hours and is mainly a weekend music venue with no real ale. Local opinion suggests that new owners may wish to demolish the pub and build on the site which has a large garden.



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The stumbling block for developers would be lack of road access to the site on the main road and side alley.

Graham Rowe supplied an update on the Ivy Leaf where there are normally four and sometimes five beers on from various breweries including Dorset, Bexley, Dartford Wobbler, Hereford, Southwark, etc. At the time he had a choice of Sharp's Doom Bar, two Caveman beers and "a very nice pint of Laine Doubloon Golden Ale".



Lyndon Jones reported that the Plough at Wilmington was facing an uncertain future and closed for a short while. However it's reopened under new management and the plan is to see how business goes and, if satisfactory, to close again for a full refurbishment in September. The pub has had a clean-up and a lick of paint

and Courage Best Bitter has been joined by Sharp's Doom Bar and a third beer.

Harvey's Best Bitter and Fuller's London Pride have been seen. Late news as this was being written was that Shepherd Neame have bought the Horse & Groom up the road at Leyton Cross. The attraction for them was no doubt the substantial food trade which had been built up but one fears for the future of the local independent real ales the pub was selling.





By now an additional handpump will have been fitted at the **Ship** at Sutton at Hone and will be used exclusively for a Timothy Taylors beer with the current two pumps continuing to provide changing guest beers.

In April Iron Pier were brewing 6 regular cask beers

(Perry Street Pale, Joined at the Hop, Bitter, Wealdway, Rosherville Red and Cast Iron Stout) and cask made up over 85% of their output. They now have six ex Speyside whisky barrels which are used to age special brews. These will be available for pre order in cask. They will be brewing two beers on their pilot kit for the Three Daws beer festival as part of the Waterfront Weekend in August. They will also have a bar as part of the event.



No Frills Joe's brewery had been operating under temporary planning permission but Dartford Council have now made this permanent. Dartford Wobbler Curiously Dark Mild won the gold medal in the mild category at the Gosport Winterfest.




enlarge on a good venture last year with an event on Father's Day, June 15th, weekend.

Nine Micropub Walking Crawl in Bexley - 1st June 2019

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PUB GAMES

Board Game: DRAUGHTS (History)

The Alquerque Family

Draughts is a very ancient game indeed, the origins of which, like Chess, aren't completely clear. However, early forms of Alquerque, its venerable ancestor, have been found in Egypt dating at least as early as 600BC. Alquerque boards can be seen carved into the stone slabs which form the roof of the great temple at Kurna, Egypt, which was built in 1400BC (of course, they might have



been carved at any point since). The game of Alquerque was played like Draughts on a 5 x 5 point board with the pieces starting in a non-symmetrical pattern. The game clearly had staying power - it is mentioned under the name of Quirkat in the Arabic work Kitab-al Aghani, the author of which died in 976 AD. Quirkat was first brought to Europe by the Moors during their invasion of Spain. It was recorded as Alquerque (Spanish form of El-Quirkat) in the Alfonso X Manuscript which was written between 1251 - 1282 at the command of Alfonso X, King of Leon and Castile.

The Madagascan game of Fanorona is a descendant of Alquerque. It seems to have been invented around 1680 AD and is still played today. Sometime later, around 1100, possibly in the South of France, somebody decided to play Alquerque on a Chess board instead of the standard Alquerque board. The game was played with 12 pieces on each side and was called Fierges or Ferses at first although this changed to Dames later. The game did not force a player to take enemy pieces when the opportunity presented itself.

The compulsory rule forcing a player to take whenever possible was introduced in France around 1535, the resulting new game being called Jeu Force. At this point the old game without huffing became known as Le Jeu Plaisant De Dames or Plaisant for short. The first book written on the game was published in Valencia, Spain in 1547 and now resides in the Royal Library of Madrid. Jeu Force is the game played in England today under the name of Draughts and the game was taken to America and called Checkers. The first book in English about it was written in 1756 by William Payne, a mathematician from London.

Draughts is known by different names around the world: Checkers (USA), Dama (Spain and Italy), La Jeu de Dames (France), Warcaby (Poland) and - das Damenspiel (Germany).

Most of the rest of Western Europe took to playing a different development of Le Jeu Plaisant De Dames which appeared in Paris in 1727 and which is now the internationally recognised game of Polish Draughts or Continental Draughts. This game is superior in complexity to English draughts by virtue of the fact that it is played on a board ten squares by ten squares and that capturing moves have an extended scope. It isn't believed to have been invented in Poland at all and they apparently know it as 'French Draughts' there! Polish Draughts was probably the name given in order to make it sound slightly different to West European ears in the same way as for <u>Chinese Checkers</u> and <u>Russian Billiards</u>.

Some areas of South East Asia go one better and play on a board of twelve by twelve squares and 24 pieces each side. The Canadian Draughts variant is also played upon a board this size.

A coach full of West Kent CAMRA, and other volunteers who served over 14,000 pints of beer at the 8th annual Spa Valley Railway Beer and Cider Festival in October 2018, the largest and most successful to date, were greeted by Miles in the brewery yard who then proceeded to provide an engaging and entertaining tour of the brewery culminating in the tasting of a range of Harvey's fine cask ales in the racking room.

Emerging into the spring sunshine Craig Beeson, West Kent Vice Chair and festival organiser, presented Miles with a Gold Award certificate for Bonfire Boy, having been voted "Beer of the Festival" by the public who chose from over 200 beers available. The three day festival is now one of the largest to be held in the south east and is unique with its three locations, as well as beers being available on the train, and will feature other favourites from Harvey's this year. This award for the Lewes brewery is very appropriate for a town with a renowned reputation for its Bonfire Night celebrations!

Craig was joined by Ian Hodge, BLO for Harvey's, who on behalf of CAMRA, officially presented Miles with the Silver Award certificate for Harvey's Old Ale in the Old Ales/Strong Milds category in the Champion Winter Beer of Britain competition at the GBBF Winterfest held in Norwich in February.

We would like to thank Miles for his hospitality and the time and effort he devoted to making the occasion so enjoyable, and look forward to welcoming Harvey's beers among the 200 which will be available at the

2019 festival; to be held over the three days 18th-20th October. The main bar will be in Tunbridge Wells West Victorian engine shed with additional bars on the platforms at Groombridge and Eridge stations and beer also available on the train.

DRINKING IN TALLINN


This is the final chapter of our trip to the ex-USSR Baltic States, allowing three nights in each of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia. Following on from my last article about Riga, this time round it is the turn of Tallinn, a destination popular for the infamous 'stag' and 'hen' weekends from the UK. The craft beer scene here has been active for the past six years, and, being a two hour ferry journey from Finland, is much Westernised.

Again, I have included a basic map; the Tourist Information Centres all provide free, more detailed maps of the City Centre. I have also omitted the opening hours, as these vary with season.

Having arrived mid-afternoon, we opted to purchase a 72 hour transport pass as the accommodation was a twenty minute walk from the centre. This covers all trams, trolley buses and buses in Tallinn, and costs a mere €5 (all residents of

Tallinn are entitled to free public transport). As a guide price for beer, expect to pay €4-6 for ½ litre.

The first bar visited was **Pudel** (3), to be found at Telliskivi 60a. This is



even be considered a micropub. Fourteen beers on tap here, but only one from Estonia, the *Mäepea Pale Ale*, from a microbrewery east of Tallinn. The second was **St Vitus** (12), close by at Telliskivi 61b, next to the Rimi supermarket. Eighteen beers here, plus *Old Rosie* cider. My eye was drawn to one of three St Vitus beers, *NISU*. This was a wheat beer, apparently brewed by St Vitus, but with no staff letting on where the brewery was, I can only guess that it was an offering from a major player. Time then for something to eat. We're in Estonia, why not find an Indian restaurant? I can highly recommend the Spice Wagon, uniquely to be found in two shipping containers perched precariously on top of one another. I decided against going for a *Cobra* in here (not even sure they serve it in Estonia), and went for a bottle of *Saku Dark*, proving again that the Carlsberg Group do have some nice offerings. Suitably full, we now headed for



Humalakoda (4), situated on the second floor of the indoor market. This opened May 2017 and has been

brewing since December that year. I was lucky enough to get a brewery

tour here from head brewer Jaan, before tasting a *Humalakoda Dark (Tume)* and a *Turu Varblane APA*.

Friday, the start of a new day. More sightseeing in a rather damp Tallinn was followed by a visit to **Uba ja**





Humal (10), a bottle shop and bar located close to the docks at Võrgu 3. Here you'll find the largest collection of bottled beers in Estonia, stocking 250 in winter and 450 in the summer. Unfortunately the bar is not manned until 2pm, so a *Muddis Baltic Porter* weighing in at 6.5% had to suffice. From here it was a twenty

minute walk over to **Kochi Aidad** (11), another microbrewery at Lootsi 10. This is the first (or last) pub



before the ferry terminals, and *Kochi Ronk Stout* was the beer of choice. Moving back into the city, next it was

the **Beer Garden** (7) at Inseneri 1. If live sports are your thing, then this place has TV screens all over the place. Beer of

choice was a *Karksi Must Nunn*, a 6% dark lager from southern Estonia. The final destination of the day for

us was **Drink Bar & Grill** (6), to be found at Väike-Karja 8. I actually do not remember the beer drunk in here, but my Facebook pictures tell me that it was a

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7.7% IPA named *Gracious* by *Sori Brewery* from Tallinn. Notes also tell me that three other Estonian beers were available on tap. This left four bars to complete on the Saturday.

Saturday started with a bus trip out to the Estonian Open Air Museum. It wasn't exactly the best day for this as it was raining

Open Air Museum. It wasn't exactly the best day for this as it was raining heavily, but the journey there and back was covered on the 72 hour pass anyhow. Set in acres of woods and open space, this place offers an insight into old Estonia, but whilst it was relaxing, it offered no chance of a decent beer. Back in Tallinn, I headed for $P\tilde{o}rgu$ (2) at Rüütli 4. A nice cellar bar hidden off the main street, it offers four of its own beers, cuckoo brewed (although overseas they always use the words 'gipsy brewed') at various other breweries, plus five others. I went for the *Populism IPA* at 4.5%, but wasn't tempted by the $P\tilde{o}hjala$ Szechuan Bänger, a Baltic Stout of 12.5% costing a reasonable \in 6.50 for $\frac{1}{2}$

litre. Incidentally, it also has some of the heaviest cast iron seats imaginable! Next it was off to the **Beer House** (8). Close to the Town Hall Square at Dunkri 5, this a German Bierkeller type establishment that's been brewing on the premises since 2002. I had the *Dunkles Extra* for \leq 5.50 for $\frac{1}{2}$ litre, but a sampler tray is available for 7 x 250ml at \leq 20. Also to be noted in here is the interior smoking room. A glass fronted room with its own chimney, I'm not sure if this a good idea or not? A pub that



you'll either love or hate was next on the list, the **Old Hansa** (1), just off Town Hall Square. What I would call a tourist trap, in here I drunk a Honey Beer. When I asked which brewery it came from I was told it was "brewed by the monk downstairs!" If medieval Disneyland coupled with a Robin Hood theme park is for you...

On the other side of the square, at Pikk 1, lies **Brewery Õlleklubi** (9), the penultimate bar visit in Tallinn. Despite the name, this place only pretends to be



a brewery and their 'own' beers are mostly rebranded Latvian ones. The one I had was marked as *Dark* at 6%, and was rumoured to have come from the Valga area of Estonia, next to the Latvian border. Last up was **Hell Hunt**, just up the road at Pikk 39, another bar that you would assume has some local beers on. Most of the beers in here are, however, brewed at Viru Õlu,


part of the Harboe Group, the second largest producer in the Nordic Countries. The *Hell Hunt Tume* was nice nevertheless.

So, to sum up Tallinn for beer purposes, be prepared to weed out the tourist traps and to investigate the back streets!


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

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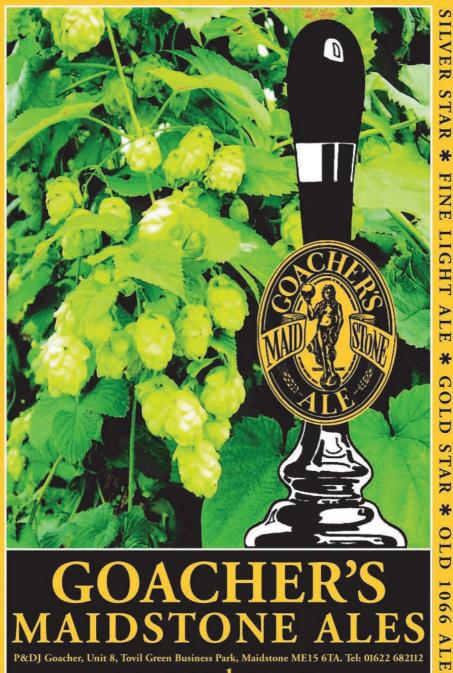
